

News from Maryse

Peace and blessings to each one of you at the beginning of this year. As I write, I have realised that 2021 offers me many reasons to be grateful. Here are a few from the past month:

- 1) Silent retreat at Santa Eulalia Retreat House. Between the endless construction of the neighbour's house and the busy avenue in front of the novitiate, there is not always silence. I thirsted for silence, and this respite outside Lima, surrounded by trees and birds, soothed my soul. As the week's spiritual exercises progressed (think of a regimen of four to five hours of intense exercise per day), I had my ups and downs, but I left with a clear sense of the purpose of my novitiate: to work through my personal history with a focus on my wounds.
- 2) A whirlwind of activities awaited us when we returned from the retreat as two housemates, Natacha and Frecia, made their first profession (first vows) the following Sunday. We also welcomed Frecia's family for a few days. What a joy to celebrate their commitment during a carefully prepared ceremony!
- 3) No rest after the vows! Frecia, Elvira (Holy Cross associate member) and I led a Christmas

pageant for the seniors of the Juan Pablo II neighbourhood with about 30 children from this underprivileged area. The children acted out some scenes from the birth of Jesus, between which they sang

"villancicos" (Christmas carols). Afterwards, everyone enjoyed panettone and hot chocolate, of course!

- 4) After the show, it was only one week before has a tradition of ending the year with a Christmas and the house was still not decorated. So we put up the decorations and the crib. Apparently, it's not a nativity scene if there's no river involved... Ideally, you want to have flowing water, like in the attached video taken in one of the oldest churches in Lima, La Merced. We made do with a paper river
- 5) After the early evening mass, due to the curfew, a community prayer and gift exchange, we celebrated Christmas with the sound of fireworks... impossible to fall asleep before the wee hours of the morning! Christmas dinner was prepared by the sisters of the Luz de Maria house, located near the novitiate. On the menu: turkey, potatoes, sweet potatoes, manioc, and ceviche! I had prepared pastries for dessert. Fortunately, I did it before Christmas, because since then the oven has been giving us a hard time...

- 6) New year, new departures... Frecia and Natacha, having finished their novitiate, took the road for their new mission. I will miss them for sure, but I am grateful for the moments of joy and growth lived together. Attached are some photos from an outing to explore the centre of Lima.
- 7) From what I understand, the congregation retreat to reflect on its highlights and name our desires for the year ahead. I summarise the graces received in 2021 as "I don't have to be perfect to live out what God is calling me to."
- 8) One final reason for thanksgiving, the success of the matching gift campaign for the Songdin Health Centre in Burkina Faso. Your generosity has exceeded all expectations: over \$106,000 has been raised, which, combined with previous donations received, gives the congregation hope for a construction start this spring. I conclude by wishing you reasons for hope and gratitude throughout 2022. Be well and, to paraphrase one of my sisters, be kind to yourself!










What We Do

It is sometimes being in the pulpit being very aware that people are listening.

It is sometimes being the strong one in a room full of grieving people.

It is sometimes resting your head on your steering wheel trying to collect yourself after such moments.

It is sometimes the joy of a baptism.

It is sometimes the sorrow of a funeral.

It is sometimes eating a great meal at a parishioner's house.

It is sometimes getting to the end of the day trying to remember if you've eaten anything today.

It is sometimes the joy of helping the prodigal son come home.

It is sometimes the sorrow of watching a defiant prodigal son leave.

It is sometimes the hours of prayer which keep you afloat.

It is sometimes the pain of scandal which drags you down.

It is sometimes getting up and knowing you are stepping on to a battlefield.

It is sometimes moments of incredible grace.

It is sometimes moments walking in the valley of death.

It is sometimes being respected.

It is sometimes being scorned.

It is not for the thin-skinned or faint of heart.


It is not for the worldly and ambitious.

Amoris Laetitia Family Year. March 19, 2021 - June 26, 2022



Since 19 March 2021, Pope Francis has invited the Catholic faithful to celebrate a year dedicated to the family and deepen our understanding of his Apostolic Exhortation *Amoris Laetitia*, "The Joy of Love". The *Amoris Laetitia* Family Year will conclude with the 10th World Meeting of Families, which will take place in Rome and will also be celebrated in local dioceses, 22 – 26 June 2022.

The Office of Family and Life at the Canadian Conference of

Catholic Bishops has created this online resource page to explore the pastoral insights of *Amoris Laetitia* through video resources, the official text divided into chapters along with reflection questions, an overview of what Catholic dioceses and eparchies of Canada are doing to celebrate this year, as well as relevant Church documents and prayers for the family. All of these resources offer ways to learn, pray, and discern. Together they represent the CCCB's ongoing accompaniment and support of today's families.

NAADOHBII: TO DRAW WATER SYMPOSIUM:

Our world is profoundly linked to water in all forms for human and ecological survival. Water is sacred. Water is life.

The Water Symposium is part of the inaugural Winnipeg Indigenous Triennial, *Naadohbii: To Draw Water*, presented by BMO Financial Group. The symposium will take place virtually with Indigenous voices from Turtle Island, Aotearoa and Australia discussing environmental, political and cultural traditions and interconnected relationships to water.

Naadohbii (pronounced NAH-DOH-BEY) is from Anishinaabemowin language and translates as "to draw/seek water." The name was gifted by Elder Dr. Mary Courchene. Featuring over 20 artists, including some newly commissioned pieces, *Naadohbii: To Draw Water* is tri-national, sharing interdisciplinary artwork from Turtle Island, Australia, and Aotearoa (New Zealand). This exhibition illustrates an axis of solidarity between Indigenous nations across the globe around environmental, political, and cultural traditions and interconnected relationships to water.

Women are traditional water carriers and givers of life. Indigenous peoples continue to be profoundly linked to water for physical and spiritual wellbeing; rivers, lakes, streams, and oceans have an impact on the health of global communities, and our relationship to the natural world. Water has become a pressing concern for the larger global community.

Naadohbii: To Draw Water considers the United Nations

Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples as well as the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls to Action, recognizing the power of art in enacting change. This exhibition contributes dialogue towards water and our changing environment from an Indigenous perspective and with an international scope. Our world is profoundly linked to water in all forms for human and ecological survival. Water is sacred. Water is life.

Join artists, curators, activists, and water defenders as they discuss the power of water during artist talks, curator panels, film screenings, and performances.


