There is an ongoing concern for the people of Ukraine and the need for support through various donation avenues. This communique provides information on how members and councils can offer help to the people of Ukraine. Catholic Near East Welfare Association-Canada (CNEWA)

A statement from CNEWA-Canada, "This kind of violence is painful to watch for Christians and people of good will throughout the world. The number of casualties continues to grow and the story is changing by the hour. But what cannot change is our deep commitment to help innocent people whose lives are in danger."

In a recent letter, the Ukrainian Catholic Women's League of Canada indicates it has partnered with CNEWA-Canada to receive donations through parishes and online. The funds will be matched up to \$500,000 by an anonymous donor. Donations can be made online at cnewa.org/ca/campaigns/ukraine/.

Canada (UCWLC)

In a letter dated March 8th, the UCWLC requests people check with the Ukrainian community in their area for trustworthy information and how to help as volunteers, as well as with Ukrainian Social Services organizations and immigration services. It asks for prayers, encourages members to let their voices be heard through local politicians and explains that, "To protect civilians, Ukraine pleads for a 'no fly zone.'" UN Refugee Agency

The United Nations estimates 12 million people inside Ukraine will need relief and protection, and more than four million Ukrainian refugees will need support in neighbouring countries. "The United Nations and humanitarian partners [have] launched coordinated emergency appeals for a combined US\$1.7 billion" to deliver aid to people in Ukraine and those fleeing to neighbouring countries.

A \$1.1 billion "Ukraine Flash Appeal" to assist six million people inside Ukraine for an initial three months will provide multipurpose financial assistance for the most vulnerable people, food, water and sanitation, support for health care and education services and shelter assistance to rebuild damaged homes. The appeal is supported by a Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) grant of \$20 million and a Ukrainian Humanitarian Fund allocation of \$18 million. As of February 24th, CERF has already allocated \$20 million for humanitarian assistance in Ukraine and neighbouring countries.

More Ways Councils and Members Can Help or Donate

Life Member Lucille Partington provides the following suggestions on how members and councils can help:

- Decorate a colourful 'Toonie Jar' for children and parishioners to give what they can.
- Support Airbnb.org's funding for shortterm housing for up to 100,000 people fleeing Ukraine. For more information, visit <u>airbnb.org/help-ukraine</u>.
- Hold a bake sale with colourful muffins decorated in Ukraine's colours of blue and yellow or host a combined bake and craft sale.
- Check with the local UCWLC or Ukrainian Catholic churches for ways to help and support. They may have avenues for donated items that can be sent to Ukraine. Be creative and use the resources in their community.
- Monitor the refugee status of those coming to Canada and support any refugee programs in their community.

Please be wary of other "sites to donate" and ensure they are from trusted established organizations.

New Name, New Location, Same Mission for Centre Flavie

Centre Flavie-Laurent is now Centre Flavie, and they're moving into a new, larger space that will enable a host of new activities to expand



their mission. "We were incorporated in 2005," explains Centre Flavie's Board Chair, Julie Turenne-Maynard. "We didn't worry about a branding strategy; we were focused on the mission. Fifteen years later, we thought it was high time to demonstrate who we are with a better visual identity. With our expansion project on the go, it was good timing for new beginnings."

Centre Flavie distributes donated goods to vulnerable and impoverished populations at no charge. They support over 100 families a day and thousands of donations are received annually. Their new visual identity reflects their work. "Everything we do comes from the heart," says Turenne-Maynard. "The heart in the logo represents the compassion in action that is demonstrated by volunteers and staff, but also by everyone in the community. The open box represents what people can pack up and take home, and visually, it looks like a person with their arms open, wanting to support those in need. It's also a very contemporary expression of the resurrection of Jesus Christ."

As for the name change, many in the community have been calling the organisation "Centre Flavie" or simply "Flavie" for years, so it was a natural progression. "We've also created a tagline: From Hearts to Homes."

The physical changes to Centre Flavie are well underway. With the help of Réseau Compassion Network, they were able to acquire and combine four plots of land to build their new space just around the corner from their current location. Located at 301 Archibald Street, the new location will over 13,000 square feet of space, significantly larger than their current location on Provencher Boulevard.

Réseau Compassion Network contributed \$550,000 towards Centre Flavie's expansion and provided expertise in real estate and project management. A strong capital campaign was also run by Centre Flavie's staff and volunteers to raise the funds to for the new location. There's still a little way to go in that campaign, and those interested in contributing to the expansion can do so HERE.

As always, the goal of the expansion is to better serve those in need in the community. "We'll be able to have a better flow of donations

coming in and recipients' goods going out," continues Turenne-Maynard. "And we'll have space for some new and exciting additions like a community garden, nicer outdoor spaces for those who are waiting for services, and a new social enterprise. We're happy to have so many news ways to demonstrate our mission to the public, our volunteers and our participants."



This store will be open to the public, feature a strong online presence and most importantly, raise funds for the work happening at Centre Flavie every day.



O Mary, Mother of God and our Mother, in this time of trial we turn to you. As our Mother, you love us and know us: no concern of our hearts is hidden from you. Mother of mercy, how often we have experienced your watchful care and your peaceful presence! You never cease to guide us to Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

Yet we have strayed from that path of peace. We have forgotten the lesson learned from the tragedies of the last century, the sacrifice of the millions who fell in two world wars. We have disregarded the commitments we made as a community of nations. We have betrayed peoples' dreams of peace and the hopes of the young. We grew sick with greed, we thought only of our own nations and their interests, we grew indifferent and caught up in our selfish needs and concerns. We chose to ignore God, to be satisfied with our illusions, to grow arrogant and aggressive, to suppress innocent lives and to stockpile weapons. We stopped being our neighbour's keepers and stewards of our common home. We have ravaged the garden of the earth with war and by our sins we have broken the heart of our heavenly Father, who desires us to be brothers and sisters. We grew indifferent to everyone and everything except ourselves. Now with shame we cry out: Forgive us, Lord!

Holy Mother, amid the misery of our sinfulness, amid our struggles and weaknesses, amid the mystery of iniquity that is evil and war, you remind us that God never abandons us, but continues to look upon us with love, ever ready to forgive us and raise us up to new life. He has given you to us and made your Immaculate Heart a refuge for the Church and for all humanity. By God's gracious will, you are ever with us; even in the most troubled moments of our history, you are there to guide us with tender love.

We now turn to you and knock at the door of your heart. We are your beloved children. In every age you make yourself known to us, calling us to conversion. At this dark hour, help us and grant us your comfort. Say to us

once more: "Am I not here, I who am your Mother?" You are able to untie the knots of our hearts and of our times. In you we place our trust. We are confident that, especially in moments of trial, you will not be deaf to our supplication and will come to our aid.

That is what you did at Cana in Galilee, when you interceded with Jesus and he worked the first of his signs. To preserve the joy of the wedding feast, you said to him: "They have no wine" (Jn 2:3). Now, O Mother, repeat those words and that prayer, for in our own day we have run out of the wine of hope, joy has fled, fraternity has faded. We have forgotten our humanity and squandered the gift of peace. We opened our hearts to violence and destructiveness. How greatly we need your maternal help!

Therefore, O Mother, hear our prayer.

Ark of the New Covenant, inspire projects and paths of reconciliation.

Queen of Heaven, restore God's peace to the world.

Eliminate hatred and the thirst for revenge, and teach us forgiveness.

Free us from war, protect our world from the menace of nuclear weapons.

Queen of the Rosary, make us realize our need to pray and to love.

Queen of the Human Family, show people the path of fraternity.

Queen of Peace, obtain peace for our world.

O Mother, may your sorrowful plea stir our hardened hearts. May the tears you shed for us make this valley parched by our hatred blossom anew. Amid the thunder of weapons, may your prayer turn our thoughts to peace. May your maternal touch soothe those who suffer and flee from the rain of bombs. May your motherly embrace comfort those forced to leave their homes and their native land. May your Sorrowful Heart move us to compassion and inspire us to open our doors and to care for our brothers and sisters who are injured and cast aside.

Holy Mother of God, as you stood beneath the cross, Jesus, seeing the disciple at your side, said: "Behold your son" (Jn 19:26.) In this way he entrusted each of us to you. At this hour, a weary and distraught humanity stands with you beneath the cross, needing to entrust itself to you and, through you, to consecrate itself to Christ. The people of Ukraine and Russia, who venerate you with great love, now turn to you, even as your heart beats with compassion for them and for all those peoples decimated by war, hunger, injustice and poverty.

Therefore, Mother of God and our Mother, to your Immaculate Heart we solemnly entrust and consecrate ourselves, the Church and all humanity, especially Russia and Ukraine. Accept this act that we carry out with confidence and love. Grant that war may end and peace spread throughout the world. The "Fiat" that arose from your heart opened the doors of history to the Prince of Peace. We trust that, through your heart, peace will dawn once more. To you we consecrate the future of the whole human family, the needs and expectations

of every people, the anxieties and hopes of the world.

Through your intercession, may God's mercy be poured out on the earth and the gentle rhythm of peace return to mark our days. Our Lady of the "Fiat," on whom the Holy Spirit descended, restore among us the harmony that comes from God. May you, our "living fountain of hope," water the dryness of our hearts. In your womb Jesus took flesh; help us to foster the growth of communion. You once trod the streets of our world; lead us now on the paths of peace. Amen.

Dear Sisters in Christ,

First, I would like to thank you for your faithful support over the decades as a cherished partner of ours. The Catholic Women's League (CWL) and Development and Peace — Caritas Canada enjoy shared values and a longstanding relationship that dates back to 1969.

As the main caregivers and educators here in Canada and in the Global South, women play a very important role in

society. Women like you regularly take action as described in Matthew 25:35, by feeding the hungry, giving water to the thirsty, clothing the naked, sheltering the homeless, providing health care to the sick and educating children.

For over 50 years, CWL members have been making contributions to the **1% Program1** in support of Development and Peace partners working to improve the status of vulnerable women in the Global South.

Through your prayers and dedication, you have turned a toonie a month into tens of thousands of dollars! Collectively, the funds you have raised have made a real difference in the lives of thousands of women searching for social and economic justice for themselves, their families and their communities.

This Year's Project

This year, the League is partnering with Development and Peace to raise funds for a community-based schools project to bring education to remote communities of Afghanistan.

Decades of war have wounded Afghanistan's social fabric and stalled its development. In rural areas, many children, especially girls, do not attend school simply because the nearest school can be up to 20 kilometres away. Furthermore, Afghan women have been

deprived of their basic human rights throughout their country's history. Despite progress in the last two decades, women's rights in Afghanistan have already suffered significant setbacks since the Taliban seized power in August 2021.

For example, after the takeover, Taliban decisions prevented most girls and women from attending secondary school and university, and local directives prevented many women from continuing to work. With

millions of Afghans unable to buy food or basic goods, and a humanitarian crisis looming, households in which women were until recently the main earners will be the hardest hit.

Furthermore, Taliban forces have used gunfire, batons and tear gas to break up protests demanding women's rights to work and education, and some women activists have been arrested or have disappeared after participating in protests.

Although the Taliban recently said classrooms would reopen for all girls and women on March 21, their studies have suffered a severe setback.

To support our sisters in Afghanistan, Development and Peace is partnering with Catholic Relief Services (CRS) on a community -based schools project in remote communities. The three-year project will allow 180 students (92 girls, 88 boys) currently in grades 1 to 3 to continue through grades 4, 5 and 6.

One of the few remaining agencies that can operate effectively in Afghanistan, CRS is making education safe and feasible for the children by (1) basing the project in communities in which it enjoys broad-based support and buy-in, (2) running classes in the children's neighbourhoods in discreet locations, often in teachers' homes, and (3) delivering the government-mandated curriculum. This project is thus a means for us to continue supporting Afghan women and girls and their rights.

A heartfelt thank-you! The Catholic Women's League has long been a dedicated supporter of Development and Peace's mission and of our sisters in the Global South who are striving for a better future. Knowing that God understands suffering and takes pity on the poor and the persecuted, you can unite your actions with His will in your support for Afghan women and girls. This project promotes their access to economic empowerment and greater dignity. Together, we can build a more just world. May your Lent be rich in spiritual graces and thank you wholeheartedly for your support!

Dear Sisters-in-Christ

COVID made 2021 a challenging year for all, including Catholic Women's League Councils that have been unable to resume their normal activities and fund-raising, which resulted in their inability to give to worthwhile Catholic charities. We at Serena Manitoba know that 2022 will be another very lean donation year. We just received more bad news that one of our main Catholic contributors will not, for the first time in many years, be able to support us this coming year due to an extreme shortage of funds.

The Catholic Women's League has always defended our Holy Catholic Church, and its moral teachings and doctrines, including its teaching on natural family planning. Although the Church has a very beautiful and rich understanding of human sexuality and the role of natural family planning, only a very small percentage of Catholics have been exposed to this message. From Blessed Pope Paul VI prophetic 1968 encyclical *Humanae Vitae*, on the regulation of birth, Saint John Paul II's development of his *Theology of the Body*, to Pope Francis' continued defense of this teaching, Serena Manitoba's volunteer teacher-couples have been available to Manitobans interested in learning how to manage their fertility using the *Sympto-Thermal Method*.

In order to function, Serena relies solely on donations. It is only with the support of strong Catholic organizations such as the CWL, and like-minded individuals, that we are able to continue teaching natural family planning. Last year most councils were unable to respond to our plea. In light of ongoing restrictions, we expect that if you are able to give a donation this year it will be very small, but even as little as ten or twenty dollars will help. Your financial assistance will ensure that Serena Manitoba can continue to provide its service to couples throughout our province. Thank you for considering this request. 












celebration—it's an entire season where we celebrate our new life in Christ. Just like Christmas, Easter is celebrated for an extended period of time—50 days to be

The feast proper is celebrated for the full octave (Easter Sunday through Easter Saturday). Then we enter Eastertide, the longer Easter season which ends on Pentecost Sunday. During these fifty days of Easter we relive the joyous events of the Glorious Mysteries of the Holy Rosary—the Resurrection, Ascension, and the coming of the Holy Spirit on Mary and the Apostles at Pentecost.

There are many ways you can make Eastertide a very special time of year for you and your family. Here are three easy ways to make the most of the Easter season this year.

1. SPREAD THE EASTER CHEER

Get yourself in the Easter mood (and others too!) by sending out Easter cards this Eastertide. This is an easy way to remind friends that Easter is an entire season, not just a single day! You can also spread the Easter cheer by surprising your family with Catholic Easter gifts that go beyond bunnies and chocolate. Make Easter cards and gifts, no matter how small, an annual tradition to honor the holiest time of year.

You can also bring back the traditional Catholic greeting at Easter: when you greet family and friends, say, "He is Risen!" The reply greeting is, "He is risen, indeed!"

2. DECORATE THE HOUSE

Spring and the Resurrection go together! Fill your house with the lovely fragrance of freshly cut flowers. Keep a beautiful bouquet in the kitchen, on the dining room table, and in each bedroom in honor of the Resurrection of Jesus and a sign of hope in our own resurrection. Give flowers to your loved ones to grace their homes as well in honor of the Easter solemnity (they would go great with an Easter card!).

You can also decorate your home by draping

white sashes on all your crosses and crucifixes, reminding your family that the joy of this season goes beyond Easter Sunday.

3. INCREASE YOUR DEVOTION

The fifty days between Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday is a great time to pray for the Holy Spirit to pour into your own life just as it did on Mary and the Apostles. The beautiful, simple prayers of the novena to the Holy Spirit are a great way to foster a devotion specifically to the Holy Spirit this Easter season.

This is also the time of year when catechumens are baptized and received as new Christians into the Church. Renew your own baptismal promises by bringing Holy Water into your home and using it regularly.

The second Sunday of Easter is Divine Mercy Sunday; therefore, this devotion is tied in a special way to the Easter season. There are many ways to make the Divine Mercy devotion a part of your life. In addition to the Divine Mercy feast day, there is also the Divine Mercy image that you can have blessed and hang in your home, the Divine Mercy chaplet which you can pray daily (it only takes 5 minutes!), and the Diary of Faustina Kowalska (the visionary who brought this great devotion to the world), which you can read during Eastertide. 



SAVE THE DATE!!! World Youth Day 2023

from all over the world experience Christ, the universality of the Church and grow deeper in faith.


