Thank you to CWL members who responded to the call to serve as an honour guard at the Feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8 th .


Congratulations to Jennifer and Toochukwu Opara on the healthy birth of their third daughter, Uchechukwu Opara born on December 20.

Greetings from Sr. Maryse Chartier, csc



Hola,

I hope this e-mail finds you in good spirits. As winter settles in the northern hemisphere, summer takes off in the southern. Dare I say that I miss winter?

Back in Lima at the end of August, I first renewed my residency permit. Since mid-October, I've been in my

new mission environment, the small town of Tacna, on Peru's border with Chile. A semi-desert zone, a dry, sunny climate 30 kilometers from the Pacific Ocean (which I have yet to see). The sunsets are magnificent, almost as beautiful as those on the Manitoba plains. I help out at the Sisters of Holy Cross's afterschool programa ("biblioteca") in the afternoons: we welcome nearly thirty school-age children to help them with their homework and reinforce their reading skills. I also continue to give a distance English course to rural students. The Tacna work also includes a workshop where sewing is taught, mainly to women, to give them a means of earning a living. Many people have left the altiplano region to look for work in Tacna.



I also had the opportunity to renew my profession as a translator. In addition to the

congregation's meetings, I had the chance to interpret at the meetings of the Congregation of Holy Cross (the name of the community of Holy Cross Fathers and Brothers) in Lima in mid-October. Except for the session on canon law, I think I did pretty well. It was also a grace to see another side of the Holy Cross charism. I also got to see the Holy Cross novices with whom I used to play volleyball when I was in the novitiate. And I can't hide the fact that four days off from washing dishes sometimes feels good!

Since September, I've been studying theology part-time again. I'm now preparing for a full-time semester of study starting in January 2024. Before landing in Ottawa, where some of my sisters have generously agreed to welcome me, I'll have the great joy of spending Christmas in Manitoba.

I'm a little short of inspiration—too many essays, perhaps? In any case, I'd like to thank you for your continued prayers, because although I like Tacna, the transition to a new place where you know almost nothing and nobody is never easy. And it takes humility to accept learning to adapt and to make mistakes.





What Did the Holy Family's Journey to Bethlehem Entail? A Closer Look at the Modern Reality



Can you imagine making this journey?

The liturgical season of Christmas has only just begun!

Christmas begins with the Nativity of Our Lord and ends on the Baptism of the Lord.

There are many things to bring to prayer as we enter into this season of celebration and thanksgiving for the gift of the Christ child.

One thing worth contemplating is the journey to Bethlehem leading up to Jesus' birth.

Immaculate Conception Parish in Worcester, Mass., shared a powerful image on social media providing a glimpse of the reality behind this journey.

The post caption reads,

"It is worth reflecting on the trip that Joseph and Mary had to take from their hometown in Nazareth to Bethlehem. Today this trip takes 31 hours walking over 90 miles over paved streets and crossing many towns AND with Google Maps to guide you. But back then, this journey was most likely over rough terrain and packed with highwaymen (robbers,) with the additional difficulty that this route is full [of] steep hills they would have to navigate. Our Lady and St. Joseph, pray for us!"

Wow!

Can you imagine making this journey? I often wonder what Joseph and Mary endured, spoke about, held in their hearts, and the love they shared.

We are told of the events leading up to the birth of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke 2: 1-7:

"In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that the whole world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria.

So all went to be enrolled, each to his own town.

And Joseph too went up from Galilee from the town of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David that is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child.

While they were there, the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to her firstborn son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."

But, as Dave Armstrong explains in a thought-provoking article from the National Catholic Register, the details are often assumed,

"Luke 2:5-6 never claims that 1) that the Blessed Virgin Mary was 8-9 months pregnant on the journey, or 2) that she delivered the baby Jesus as soon as they arrived in Bethlehem (like all the movies

assume). All we know from these two verses is that 1) she was pregnant while making the journey, and 2) she delivered the baby Jesus in Bethlehem.

We know not a thing about how far along in her pregnancy she was, or



how long they were in Bethlehem before she bore baby Jesus. It's all mere groundless assumptions and speculations. We're just so used to thinking about it in a certain way that we overlook the fact that certain things aren't definitively stated."

There is a lot of mystery surrounding these events, but one thing is certain: the journey to Bethlehem led to the birth of our Savior!

Was Jesus a Palestinian? Setting the History Right

Canada Set to Allow Doctors to Euthanize Mentally III People

Canada is set to offer assisted suicide to Canadians with mental illnesses, The New York

Times reported on Wednesday.

The law would make Canada one of the few countries that allow individuals struggling with mental illness to seek assisted suicide through a doctor, according to the NYT. It is set to go into effect in March, and has drawn condemnation from lawmakers and mental health professionals, the latter of whom fear it will undercut their efforts to help their patients and prevent them from committing suicide.

"I'm trying to keep my patients alive," Dr. John Maher, an Ontario-based psychiatrist, told the NYT. "What does it mean for the role of the physician, as healer, as bringer of hope, to be offering death? And what does it mean in practice?"

Canada made assisted suicide legal in 2016 and health issues, according to the NYT. Some currently offers the service to citizens who suffer from terminal illnesses or physical and chronic disorders, according to the NYT. Approximately 13,200 Canadians died by assisted suicide in 2022, a 31% increase from the year prior; roughly 45,000 people in total have died from assisted suicide since the law was enacted in 2016, according to CBC.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's government has defended the planned expansion of assisted suicide to mentally ill individuals, citing a 2019 Quebec court ruling that mandates its approval, according to the NYT. Canada's Conservative Party has decried the expansion, warning it will fuel a "culture of death," and many Canadians feel the focus should be instead on expanding the country's underfunded psychiatric care services.

Defenders of the new law argue that it would be inhumane not to offer assisted suicide to individuals who struggle with severe mental

psychiatrists and doctors argue that an individual will only be eligible for assisted suicide after they have consulted with multiple doctors, who must deem their mental health complications irreparable.

But others in the psychiatry field say that these consultations cannot truly determine whether or not these individuals' mental state is beyond healing, according to the NYT.

"The research that we have shows psychiatrists are no better at identifying who's not going to get better," Maher told the NYT. "The challenge for us is it's not a short-term process. When people have been sick for years, healing takes years."

The law is scheduled to go into effect in March 2024, but its ratification could be stonewalled by Canada's parliament, which has delayed it over the last three years following the Quebec court's ruling, according to the NYT.

Rescued by Mother Teresa, Minnesota man now shares his incredible stories of two nuns

In 1962, when he was just an infant, Patrick Norton was abandoned on the streets of Bombay, India, where Mother Teresa found him. She brought him to the St. Joseph nursery and eventually he was transferred to Our Lady's Home in Mumbai, where he joined One day, Norton was told that he and 250 orphaned boys.

"We went to Mass 365 days a year and always prayed the rosary at 7 p.m.," Norton, now 61, recalled. His faith life was rich, but his earthly life was very poor.

Norton remembers sleeping on the floor and having tough times. "I was so hungry sometimes that I ate my homework paper and eraser. Other boys did that too," he told CNA.

Once, when there was no food, Norton said they all prayed an extra rosary, pleading to Our Lady for help. "I remember big trucks came and brought us donations: powdered milk and dried eggs and flour," he said.

"Sometimes, we went to the apartment next to the orphanage to dig in the garbage for toys," Norton recalled. "One time, I found a

piece of paper from a magazine. It said 'U.S.A.' There was a house in the picture. It looked so nice."

Norton showed it to one of the priests. "Throw it out," he said. "You're never going to go there."

Norton instead took some wet rice and, using it as glue, he stuck the picture on his wall. "I prayed to God that one day, I would ... go there," he

Months passed. One night during the war between Pakistan and India, the boys were ushered out into the night

by the two nuns and two priests who cared for them, hoping they would be missed by the bombings. The boy gazed up at the stars and moon, a reprieve from the explosions around him. "I said, 'God, forget about the war. Look how beautiful your world is," he recounted. "Then I heard a voice: 'I'm going to bring you to one of the greatest nations in the world.""

And so, it came to pass.

another boy named Martin would be adopted by a large American family: Judge John Henry and Marjorie Norton, who had nine children and had then adopted five more. There were many delays, but finally, Norton left for Connecticut on Oct. 25, 1976, at the age of

14, and was embraced by his new family.

"There were 14 of us," Norton said. "We were on 'Good Morning America' on TV. My father was asked: 'Why did you adopt so many kids?' He answered: 'I wanted to thank God for all he has given us."

Norton's devotion to the Catholic faith and the rosary continued with his new family.

"Every evening after supper, we'd all gather for the rosary," Norton said. As a teenager in his new home, he would cut out pictures of the Blessed Mother from issues of **SOUL** Magazine with the message to pray the rosary daily. "I'd ride my bike to outside phone booths and hang the pictures up," Norton shared. "It was my way of evangelizing."

When Norton was 21, working as a maintenance superintendent of two buildings, a favorite spot he went for breakfast was Johnny's Restaurant in Fairfield, Connecticut. "Once, I asked the owner how business was going," Norton said. "He told me it was very slow. I said, 'Johnny, put a picture of the Blessed Mother in your window.' He did, and business became very busy. Later, I saw that he added a picture of Jesus in the window."

As a young adult, Norton met his future wife, Sandy, on a pilgrimage, and eventually they married, moved to Minnesota, and had three children — Maria, Anna, and Joseph. Amazingly, Sandy recalled seeing the Norton family on "Good Morning America" when she was a teenager.

Private prayer for Benedict XVI's intercession



A Brazilian bishop authorized the first prayer to ask for Benedict XVI's intercession.

Only a few weeks after Pope Benedict XVI's death, Brazilian bishop Dom Antônio Carlos Rossi Keller of the Diocese of Frederico Westphalen authorized a private

prayer to seek the intercession of the deceased pontiff.

He explained his reasoning

Only the Church can officially say whether Benedict XVI will be canonized or not, if he lived the Christian virtues in a heroic degree. So this is a filial prayer, it is not an official prayer of the Church, it is a prayer of the sons and daughters who knew the pope through his person, his writings, his teachings, and they realize that he is a man who loved God very much, loved the Church very much, served with generosity and dedication, to the point that when he realized he no longer had the strength to Pray the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be. govern the Church, he humbly withdrew. For these reasons, I composed this prayer, naturally with the value of personal piety, and it should not be said publicly, only individually. believe that many graces will be granted through the intercession of Benedict XVI.

The prayer is intended as a private prayer and does not guarantee that Benedict XVI would ever be canonized a saint.

However, it is among the first steps in the long road to canonization.

If the cause for his canonization was ever approved, Benedict XVI would join a long list of popes in the last century who have been

received and seeking forgiveness for shortcomings. We also look ahead with a hopeful heart, praying for God's guidance and grace in the year to come.
